Student Equity & Achievement Program Requirements (Ed Code 78222b):

As a condition of the receipt of funds for purposes of this section, a district shall comply with all of the following:

- 1. Maintain a student equity plan pursuant to Section 78220 to ensure equal educational opportunities and to promote student success for all students, regardless of race, gender, age, disability, or economic circumstances.
- 2. **Provide matriculation services** (orientation, counseling and advising, referral to specialized student support services, and other education planning services needed to assist a student in making informed decisions about his or her educational goal and course of study and in developing an education plan).
- 3. Adopt and implement AB 705
- 4. Provide all non-exempt* students with an education plan





State Funding and Expenditure Guidelines



- Future SEA funding formula is in development.
- Expenditures align with SEA Program requirements/ Statewide goals.
- Non-allowable expenditures: gifts, stipend for students for participation, political contribution, courses generating FTES, supplanting.








Measuring Equity Gaps – Percentage Point Gap

Sample Baseline Data for SRJC's Disproportionately Impacted Groups

Overall SRJC Student Retention (Fall to Spring) 69.7%

- Native American (Female): 58.4%
- African American (Male): 60.3%
- Latinx (Male): 66.4%
- White(Male): 67.7%
- First Generation (Female): 67.7%
- First Generation (Male): 65.3%
- Foster Youth (Male): 61.6%
- Veteran (Female): 63.3%
- Veteran (Male): 60.7%



% of SRJC Students with Education Plans








