Welcome back, everyone. The Academic Senate remains ever more committed to the Mission, Vision, and Values of SRJC and the communities we serve. Here's to the good work ahead as we protect our students, one another, and our communities. On a personal and professional note and as a queer, first generation sociologist, I remain 110% dedicated to our work together on all fronts. Together we rise. Together we resist. Together we thrive.

Last week I attended in person the ASCCC Fall Plenary 2024 session in picturesque Visalia, California, and I appreciated the quaint downtown area and its walkability. I did not get a chance to meet to discuss the resolutions with you all prior to the conference, and in consultation with our Past President, I've come to understand just how difficult it is to schedule this work given when resolutions are published and released. I will be working with our Senate leadership team to find an appropriate time to do this work – assuming we have the resolutions available to us in time to meet Brown Act requirements – prior to the 2025 ASCCC Spring Plenary.

I can report that the biggest value I experienced as a Fall Plenary participant was two-fold. First, the chance to have "water cooler" conversations with colleagues from across the state as a first time delegate (but not first time attendee) helped me more deeply understand and appreciate the role and responsibilities of Senate President, and, second, the ways in which we all support one another with resources, ideas, and the sharing of stories, ideas, and perspectives. Conversations I had with colleagues from Mira Costa College, Gavilan College, Lassen College, DeAnza College, City College of San Francisco, San Diego City College, and Mendocino College, just to name a few, were humbling, inspiring, and insightful. I gained important perspectives and resources on establishing a collaborative process by which a standard academic calendar could be reached, for example, and will be bringing that process to SRJC in AY25-26. Many conversations were had about the changing national landscape, and while no solutions are readily available, this is an all hands on deck moment now and going forward as we look ahead to what's next for our state, our region, our nation, and the world.

Spring 2025 - Communities of Practice (CoPs) Call for Proposals

The Academic Senate Executive Committee (ASEC) invites proposals for Communities of
Practice (CoPs) for the Spring 2025 semester.

The deadline for CoP proposals is noon (12:00pm) Friday, November 22nd, 2024. Webform link to submit proposal HERE.

An Academic Senate Community of Practice (CoP) is a set of conversations sustained over a period of time (days, weeks, or months) amongst faculty, and sometimes other community members, with shared areas of inquiry and exploration. SRJC's faculty includes those with experience and educational backgrounds that can be of value to the community as a whole in our efforts to realize the equity-centered reforms that all colleges in the CCC system are making. This is particularly important in light of recent national events.

Community of Practice proposals should be related to at least one of the following themes:

- IDEAA (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Accessibility, and Anti-racism)
- Culturally responsive andragogy
- Guided Pathways
- Discipline-specific professional development (e.g. Student Learning Outcomes assessment, legislative impacts on curriculum, and/or other activities based on specific needs of SRJC disciplines and programs)

CoPs metrics for assessment: These CoPs are funded by the Student Equity and Achievement (SEA) budget. Proposals should align with one or more of the following metrics requested by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) in the annual SEA report. Proposals should identify the metric with which they are aligned and briefly describe how they correlate.

SRJC is focusing on First Generation students for each of the five metrics as follows:

- 1. Successful Enrollment
- 2. Completed Transfer-level Math & English in First Year
- 3. Persistence First Primary Term to Secondary Term
- 4. Transfer to a Four-year Institution
- 5. Completion (attained the Vision Goal Completion Definition)

Important Organizational and Scheduling Aspects to Keep in Mind Include:

- Each approved CoP includes a required 12.5 hours of total meeting time.
- Facilitators and participants are eligible for compensation at the base hourly rate, PGI, or CoP flex credit.
- Facilitators are eligible for 25 hours of compensation, participants are eligible for 12.5 hours of compensation.
- CoPs may include additional time for homework / outside reading. Participants may receive flex credit only for this time.
 - If your proposal includes homework / outside reading, please include an estimate of the total hours.
- CoP meetings may be scheduled during the Spring 2025 semester, Monday, January 13th
 Friday, May 16th 2025.
- Selections will be made by the Academic Senate Executive Committee and Dean Victor Tam.
- Facilitators will be notified by email by Wednesday, November 27th 2024. A call for participants will be sent out the following week.
