#### ACADEMIC SENATE for California Community Colleges

Title 5 \$53200 (b): Academic Senate means an organization whose primary function is to make recommendations with respect to academic and professional matters. In Section 53200 (c), "Academic and professional matters" means the following policy development and implementation matters:

- Curriculum including establishing prerequisites and placing courses within disciplines
- 2 Degree and certificate requirements
- 3 Grading policies
- 4. Educational program development
- 5 Standards or policies regarding student preparation and success
- **6** District and college governance structures, as related to faculty roles
- 7 Faculty roles and involvement in accreditation processes, including self-study and annual reports
- 8 Policies for faculty professional development activities
- 9 Processes for program review
- 10 Processes for institutional planning and budget development
- +1 Other academic and professional matters as are mutually agreed upon between the governing board and the academic senate.

### What is The Brown Act? 9:45-9:55

"The Brown Act was enacted in 1953 to guarantee the public's right to attend and participate in meetings of local legislative bodies, and as a response to growing concerns about local government officials' practice of holding secret meetings that were not in compliance with advance public notice requirements. The Brown Act is pivotal in making public officials accountable for their actions and in allowing the public to participate in the decision making process.

"The people of this State do not yield their sovereignty to the agencies which serve them. The people, in delegating authority, do not give their public servants the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is good for them not to know. The people insist on remaining informed so that they may retain control over the instruments they have created."

The Ralph M. Brown Act, California Government Code § 54950. (as found here online)

### Act?

Public agencies, like locally-elected community college boards of trustees, must meet Brown Act requirements in the conduct of their business.

- The items to be discussed and acted upon at board meetings must normally be announced to the public 72 hours prior to the meeting at which the board will deliberate.
- Items may not be acted upon of which the public received no notice.

The question of whether local senates are subject to the Brown Act is explicitly addressed in California Attorney General opinion 83-304, dated July 28, 1983.

#### Brown Act Classic Rules

- Agendas must identify each teleconference location and be posted at each location
- Each location must be open and accessible to the public and allow for public participation
- Agenda must provide an opportunity for public comment from each teleconference location
- At least a quorum of the legislative body must participate from locations within the local agency's jurisdiction
- All votes must be audible and taken by roll call

### New Rules on Remote Meetings

The Brown Act requirements for remote meetings are changing due to new laws that took effect on January 1, 2023 and the Governor's announcement that the COVID-19 State of Emergency will end on February 28, 2023. The purpose of this memo is to provide a summary of the legal requirements applicable to remote District Brown Act body meetings once the Governor's declared State of Emergency expires. As you will see from the discussion below, the practical impact of recent legal changes is that most Los Rios Brown Act meetings will be held on ground and in person. Virtual meetings held entirely via Zoom, as we have conducted public meetings throughout the pandemic, will no longer be authorized under the law.



#### AB 2449 – Limited Remote Participation for Members

- AB 2449 does not allow for fully virtual Brown Act meetings
  - At least a quorum must be participating from a singular physical location identified on the agenda and open to public
  - No need to post remote locations and open them to the public ("classic" Brown Act teleconference rules)
- Remote member must use a two-way audiovisual platform, or phone-in plus webcast AND public must have same ability to access the meeting virtually

#### AB 2449 – Limited Remote Participation for Members

- An individual member must notify the full membership of the body that either "just cause" or "emergency circumstances" exit for their remote participation
  - Just Cause includes caring for a family member, contagious illness, a need related to a physical or mental disability, or travel while on business of the legislative body.
  - **Emergency Circumstances** require the member to provide a description of the circumstances, and the body must take action to approve (a vote of the membership).

#### AB 2449 – Limited Remote Participation for Members

- Limitations on Just Cause and Remote Participation:
  - An individual member may only utilize the just cause exception up to two meetings per calendar year
  - An individual member may not participate in meetings remotely under AB 2449 for more than three consecutive months, or 20% of the body's regular meetings in a calendar year
- If there is an internet disruption to an AB 2449 meeting, no further action may be taken on an agenda item until the issue is resolved

### Robert's Rules of Order - 9:55 - 10:15

Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised (RONR) is our identified parliamentary authority. RONR seeks to make space for maximum participation by all voices, but the rules that create the opportunity feel off-putting to some. The most significant aspects of RONR include the following:

- We speak to the issue, never to the person
- **Each senator gets a chance to speak** to an issue prior to anyone getting a second turn, and no one speaks more than twice on same item
- **Refrain from repeating** points already brought up, and do not speak just to endorse another's point
- Senator making the motion states their name and speaks to it first once chair has restated it
- Once a motion is on the floor, deliberation moves into pro/con debate format (either informally from the table or formally at pro/con mics) and should focus on the specific motion (chair may ask who wishes to speak for or against to facilitate debate)
- In pro/con debate, when one side no longer has senators wishing to speak, debate ceases and the vote is called
- When an Action Item is taken up, there is new opportunity for discussion of the specific motion and its merits (placement on Action agenda does not preclude discussion, but allows for notice that a vote may take place and a decision be made)
- You may be in favor of the spirit of a motion but still vote it down so that an improved motion may be made
- Once a motion is made and restated by the chair, it is the property of the body and can only be withdrawn by vote or unanimous consent.

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What else could we do, employing RONR, to ensure all voices are heard and deliberations are as equitable as possible while also keeping business moving along?

## **Debate Guidelines**

- Starting with the pro mic, speakers will alternate between the pro and con mics
- Procedural or parliamentary questions can be asked at any time at the the parliamentary mic
- The debate ends when there are no speakers left at either the pro or con mic. This is still the case when there are speakers left at the other mic.

#### ARTICLE IV: MEETINGS & CONSTITUENT COMMUNICATION

- Must attend **in-person** at one of two designated locations on SR and Petaluma Campus
- Article VI, Sections 3 and 5, which deal with proxies and absences. :
  - A Senator who is unable to attend a meeting may designate in writing any other member of the Senate as proxy. All proxies must be in the hands of the Senate's President or other Executive Committee member prior to the Call to Order of any meeting.
  - Senators should notify the Senate President, Executive Secretary, and Administrative Assistant of an absence. A Senate member absent from two consecutive meetings of the Senate or 50 percent of the meetings in a semester may be declared delinquent by the President after discussion with the Senator and the Executive Committee. If so declared, that seat will be considered vacant.
- Contact area constituents and attend at least one meeting for department(s) or area(s) of representation:
  - Opportunity to present their concerns
  - Report on Senate actions
  - Emphasize constituents play an active role by contacting representatives, attending meetings, and expressing concerns at Open Forum
  - Send regular electronic reports using Senate Distribution Lists (i.e. DL.SENATE.ACAD.10 for Area 10)
