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CONSTITUTION OF THE SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE ACADEMIC SENATE

4 PREAMBLE:

6 This Academic Senate is created to secure the professional rights and to carry out the responsibilities of the faculty of the Sonoma County Junior College District. The faculty 7 have the traditional right of college faculty to participate in the governance of the 8 9 college. As specialists in specific disciplines and as experienced instructors, the 10 participation of the faculty in the governance of the college is essential for the district's pursuit of its mission. As professionals, the faculty have a right and a duty to set 11 professional and ethical standards for the conduct of their profession and to promote 12 the excellence of their profession. In order to achieve these ends and in accordance with 13 Title 5 of the California Administrative Code, Subchapter 2, Sections 53200-53205, this 14 15 Academic Senate is established. 16 17 **ARTICLE I: NAME** 18 Section 1: 19 20 The organization shall be known as the Santa Rosa Junior College Academic Senate, 21 hereinafter called the Senate. 22 23 ARTICLE II: PURPOSES, DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES 24 25 Section 1: 26 27 To promote the professional interests of the faculty of the Sonoma County Community 28 College District and to participate in the collegial governance of the college. 29 30 Section 2: 31 32 33 To provide the faculty with a representative body to carry out all responsibilities delegated to a community college academic senate by state law, the Board of Governors 34 35 of the California Community Colleges, and the Board of Trustees as outlined in the 36 Bylaws. 37 Section 3: 38 39 40 To promote communication and mutual understanding among the faculty. 41 42 Section 4: 43 To promote the development and maintenance of teaching excellence within the framework of academic freedom and professional responsibilities and ethics in 44 advancement of the goals of inclusivity, diversity, equity, accessibility, and anti-45 racism (IDEAA) in all 10+1 matters.. 46

- 1 2 ARTICLE III: THE ELECTORATE 3 Section 1: 4 5 6 The Electorate means those who may run for a senate seat, vote in a senate election in 7 their area, and vote for senate president. The electorate consists of all faculty working in one of two conditions: A. Contract, consisting of tenured, tenure-track, and temporary 8 9 full-time faculty; and B. Adjunct Associate, consisting of adjunct associate or hourly faculty who are currently employed by the district or have offer rights. Personnel whose 10 11 job requires an administrative or supervisory credential or who are placed on the administrative salary schedule shall not be members of the senate. 12 13 ARTICLE IV: MEMBERSHIP AND ORGANIZATION OF THE SENATE 14 15 16 Section 1: 17 18 Any member of the electorate can run for a seat on the Senate. 19 Section 2: The Senate shall consist of 26 28 senators elected as representatives and any officers 20 who are elected at-large. 21 22 23 Section 3: 24 25 The 26-28 elected representatives shall represent at least -14-15 different areas of the electorate. The method of division into the **<u>14-15</u>** areas shall be specified in the 26 Bylaws. Four-Six positions will be reserved for election by the adjunct associate 27 electorate as specified in the Bylaws. 28 29 30 Section 4: 31 32 Senators shall be elected for two-year terms. Half the Senate will be elected each year. 33 Section 5: 34 The officers of the Senate shall be members of the Senate and include the President, 35 President-elect, a Vice President, Executive Secretary, Equity Advocate, At-Large Representative, Associate Representative, Past President, and others as deemed 36 37 38 necessary. 39 Section 6:
- 40 The President-elect shall be a full-time <u>contract, tenure-track</u> faculty member, and a
- 41 <u>current or former senator or former senator.</u> The President-elect will be elected at-large
- by the electorate. After serving one year, the President-elect will assume the duties of
- 43 the President for two years. In the election cycle at the end of the first year, the

| 1 | President may run for a continuing term of either one or two years; if elected to a third |
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| 2 | year, at the end of the second year of the first term, the President may run for a fourth |
| 3 | year. The President will not serve more than four consecutive years. After completion |
| 4 | of the terms of President, the President will <u>may</u> serve as Past President for <u>up to</u> two |
| 5 | years. The Past President may be excused from the second year as Past President by |
| 6 | agreement of the Executive Committee. |
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| 8 | Section 7: |
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| 10 | The Vice President and the , Executive Secretary <mark>, Equity Advocate, At-Large</mark> |
| 11 | Representative, and Associate Representative shall be elected from among the area |
| 12 | representatives current senators and shall serve for two years. Two to three of the |
| 13 | officers of the Senate will be elected each year. |

| 20 | ARTICLE V: VACANCIES AND RECALL |
| 20 | ARTICLE V. VACANCIEJ AND RECALL |
| 22 | Section 1: |
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| 24 | When vacancies occur, upon direction of the Senate, new members or officers shall be |
| 25 | nominated and elected by the appropriate constituency as soon as possible within that |
| 26 | semester appointed by the Senate President in consultation with the Executive |
| 27 | Committee. Faculty members recruited from the representative area will be given |
| 28 | priority when filling the seat, and the Executive Committee will also strongly consider |
| 29 | the goals of IDEAA when making appointments. |
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| 31 | Section 2: |
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| 33 | When a Senator is on authorized leave, the Senate President in consultation with the |
| 34 | Executive Committee may appoint a replacement to serve until the Senator returns to |
| 35 | active service. |
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| 37 | Section 3: |
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| 39 | The recall of a Senator shall be accomplished by presentation to the Senate of a petition |
| 40 | signed by a majority of the electorate. Upon the receipt of such petition at a Senate |
| 41 | meeting, the Senate shall declare the seat vacant. |
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| 43 | ARTICLE VI: AMENDMENTS, INITIATIVE, AND REFERENDUM |
| 44 | Section 1: |
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| 46 | The constitution may be amended by the following initiative processes: |
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| 1 2 3 | Clause 1: A petition signed by ten percent of the electorate shall be presented to the Senate, or the Senate may vote to submit the amendment(s) to the electorate. |
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| 3 4 5 6 | Clause 2: If approved by two-thirds of those voting, the amendment(s) shall become effective on the date specified in the amendment(s). |
| 7 8 | Section 2: |
| 9 10 | Other initiative measures shall proceed as follows: |
| 11 12 13 | Clause 1: The Senate shall place on the ballot an initiative or referendum measure signed by ten percent of the electorate. |
| 14 15 | Clause 2: If approved by two-thirds of the votes cast, the measure shall receive appropriate action of the Senate. |
| 16 17 18 | Section 3: |
| 19 20 21 | Future State legislation or directives affecting Community College Academic Senates shall be presented to the electorate in the form of constitutional amendments. |
| 21 22 23 | Section 4: |
| 24 25 26 | The President of the College and the Board of Trustees shall be consulted in advance of any major changes in this document. |
