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QUESTION 1: Should we approve workshop proposals that are designed specifically for members of a particular department?

Considerations against of approving such workshops	Current Practice	Considerations in favor of approving such workshops
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Members of the department may feel pressure to attend the workshop, even if there is another workshop at the same time they'd rather attend. If too many departments do this at once, there is a diminishingly small number of people available to attend other workshops. Reduces 'collaborative' and 'cross-pollination' opportunities 	<p>Approve them all, with the following stipulations:</p> <p>May be scheduled for a max of 3 hours</p> <p>May be scheduled only in the afternoon</p>	<p>Specific Departments might need substantial just-in-time professional development sessions, for example:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Significant changes in Ed Code Technological changes New or significantly revised programs

QUESTION 2: Should we approve workshop proposals that are offered only in an online modality? Should there be a limit to how many?

Considerations against too many online workshops	Current Practice	Considerations in favor of online workshops
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> In-person attendance could be radically diminished With that, the community-building aspects of the day are also diminished Not all faculty/staff can or want to learn in this modality 	<p>Approve them all</p> <p>Try to spread them out so there are no more than 1 – 2 per session</p>	<p>Helpful for faculty who...</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> are too sick/injured to come in person, but able to participate virtually have transportation issues, live too far to come in person would prefer to be at their computer for the particular topic offered

QUESTION 3: What should we prioritize when designing PDA day programming?

- Making sure that attendees have access to the workshops that are most relevant and valuable for them.
- Bringing people together & creating opportunities for cross-pollination and collaboration.
